

Christmas Holiday Safety Tips

The Christmas holiday is a time for families and friends to get together. Flickering lights, festive celebrations and Christmas trees are hallmarks of this season. These basic precautions will help ensure your family remains safe throughout this joyous time.

- Water fresh Christmas trees daily. Place trees away from heaters, candles, and fireplaces.
- Blow out candles.
- Consider switching to LED lights that are cooler and use less electricity than traditional lights. Turn off lights when you leave the

house or go to bed.

- Have working smoke alarms. You
- need working smoke alarms on every level of your home and outside all

sleeping areas. Replace smoke alarms if they are over 10 years old.

- Use extension cords wisely. Extension cords should only be used as a temporary connection. Don't overload them and match the cord to the appliance. Never put cords under rugs as this can damage the cord and cause a fire.



The Christmas spirit is reaching a crescendo as we busily purchase those last minute gifts. Most of us spend more than we intend — making it a season of "red" for our checkbooks. Here are a few ideas to help you save on your energy costs, so you have a little "green" when your January electric bill rolls around.

- Switch to LED Christmas lights. They use 90 percent less energy than incandescent bulbs, last up to 100,000 hours, produce little heat (for fire safety) and come in a wide variety of sizes and shapes.
- Use fiber optic trees and decorations. These incorporate a single bulb at the base to illuminate the whole display.
- Install timers on outdoor decorations. We recommend five hours per evening for energy savings of up to 50 percent on holiday lighting costs.

Christmas Energy Savings

- Turn off other area lighting in the room that contains your Christmas tree, which should provide more than enough lighting to navigate around the room.
- Decorate outdoor areas with old-fashioned candle luminaries along walkways. These decorations can achieve a beautiful holiday glow without adding to the electric bill.
- Lower the thermostat a few degrees when company arrives. Extra bodies means extra warmth at no cost to you.
- Invest in rechargeable batteries (and a charger) for all those gifts that require batteries.
- Bake several dishes at a time. It takes the same amount of energy to heat a full oven as it does a nearly empty one.

Recipe of the Month

Butter Pecan Turtle Cookie Bars

Crust:

- 2 cups flour
- 1 cup firmly packed brown sugar
- 1/2 cup soft butter
- 1 cup whole pecan pieces

caramel layer is bubbly.

Caramel Layer:

- 2/3 cup butter
- 1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar
- 1 cup chocolate chips

Directions: Heat oven to 350 degrees. Combine all crust ingredients except pecans. Beat at medium speed until well mixed (2 to 3 minutes). Press into bottom of 9 x 13 pan. Place pecans on top of crust. In saucepan, combine butter and brown sugar for caramel layer. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly until entire surface begins to boil. Boil for 1 minute, stirring constantly. Pour evenly over pecans. Bake 18 to 22 minutes or until entire

Remove from oven and immediately sprinkle with chocolate chips. Allow to melt slightly. Swirl chips leaving some whole for marbled effect. Cool completely; cut into bars. Yield: 3 dozen.
