

If you haven't strung your lights, be sure to use LED light strands. LEDs consume far less energy than incandescent lights and can last 40 holiday seasons. They're also safer because they're made with epoxy lenses, not glass, making them resistant to breaking — and they're cool to the touch.

If you missed Santa's memo about energy saving LEDs and your holiday lights are already up, you can still save on lighting costs. All you need is a programmable light timer. With a light timer, you can easily program when you want your holiday lights turned on and off, which will save you time, money and energy. If you're using a timer for exterior lighting, make sure it's weatherproof and intended for outdoor use.

Fire Prevention: Home Heating

The winter season is now upon us, bringing colder temperatures and potentially more time spent inside. Did you know that auxiliary heating sources are the second leading cause of home fires?

In recent years, heating equipment was the cause of 62,200 reported U.S. home structure fires, with 670 deaths, 1,550 injuries and \$909 million in direct property damage. Nearly half of all home heating fires occur in December, January and February.

Portable space heaters are responsible for almost one-third of all home heating fires and three-fourths of all deaths. The main reason — heating equipment was placed too close to combustible items (things that can burn), such as furniture, rugs, clothing, window treatments, mattresses and bedding.

Let's talk about preventing fires both at work and home. If you utilize a portable space heater this winter, ensure you follow these safety tips:

- Keep heaters at least three feet away from anything that can easily catch fire.

- Don't put heaters near drapes, furniture and other flammable materials.

- Place the heater on a level surface and away from high traffic areas to avoid knocking it over.

- It is never recommended to use an extension cord to power an auxiliary heat source and it should be plugged directly into a GFCI outlet, unless otherwise specified by the manufacturer.

- Never leave a space heater unattended or running while you sleep.

- Keep electric heaters away from water. Never use them near a sink or in the bathroom.

CEC Line Clearing to Improve System Reliability

CEC will begin tree trimming on Jan. 1, 2022, to reduce outages and service interruptions caused by trees. Contracted line clearing crews will work on circuits originating from Coalhill and Wildcat (Rimersburg), High Rock and Four Winds (Starr), Beaver, Lucinda and Karns City substations in Clarion, Forest and Butler counties. This project will last throughout 2022.

CEC will utilize Hazlett Tree Service, Davey

Tree Service, Pittman Tree Service and Wright Tree Service. CEC members may encounter contracted crews. All contractors carry company issued identification.

Recipe of the Month

Almond Skillet Cookies

Ingredients:

- 1-1/2 sticks butter
- 1-1/2 cups sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1-1/2 cups flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon almond extract
- 1/4 cup sliced almonds

Directions:

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Line a 10-inch, ovensafe skillet with heavy duty foil or parchment paper — allowing plenty of excess to lift the cookies out after baking. Cream butter and sugar. Add eggs one at a time. Beat in flour, salt and almond extract. Pour batter into skillet. Top with sliced almonds and bake for 35-40 minutes. Using the excess skillet liner, lift cookies out to cool on a rack. Peel off the liner and cut into narrow wedges to serve.
