

pants in March. Too often today the word "resolution" has taken on the connotation of a short-lived, never-realized goal. I prefer the interpretation that a resolution is a firm decision to do something — that we are determined to reach our goals, and our efforts and dedication will not be deterred.

At CEC we are resolved to operate in accordance with the following seven cooperative principles:

1. Voluntary and Open
Membership: Cooperatives are
voluntary organizations, open to
all persons able to use their
services and willing to accept the
responsibilities of membership,
without gender, social, racial,
political or religious
discrimination

2. Democratic Member
Control: Cooperatives are
democratic organizations
controlled by their members,
who actively participate in
setting policies and making
decisions. The elected
representatives are
accountable to the membership.
In cooperatives, members have
equal voting rights — one
member, one vote.

3. Members' Economic
Participation: Members
contribute equitably to, and
democratically control, the capital
of their cooperative. At least part
of that capital is usually the
common property of the

cooperative. Members usually receive limited compensation, if any, on capital subscribed as a condition of membership. Members allocate surpluses for any or all of the following purposes: developing the cooperative, possibly by setting up reserves, part of which at least would be indivisible; benefitting members in proportion to their transactions with the cooperative; and supporting other activities approved by the membership.

4. Autonomy and Independence: Cooperatives are autonomous, self-help organizations controlled by their members. If they enter into agreements with other organizations, including governments, or raise capital from external sources, they do so on terms that ensure democratic control by their members and maintain their cooperative autonomy.

**5. Education, Training, and Information:** Cooperatives provide education and training for their members, elected representatives, managers and employees so they can contribute effectively to developing their cooperatives. They inform the general public — particularly young people and opinion leaders — about

the nature and benefits of cooperation.

#### 6. Cooperation Among Cooperatives:

Cooperatives serve their members most effectively and strengthen the cooperative movement by working together through local, national, regional and international structures.

**7. Concern for Community:** While focusing on member needs, cooperatives work for the sustainable development of their communities through policies accepted by their members.

At the end of every year we take time to reflect on the progress we have made and identify the steps we plan to take to keep moving forward. # Winter Safety Tips: Slips, Trips & Falls

A slip, trip or fall can lead to injury or even death. To help protect yourself this winter:

- Plan ahead and give yourself enough time so you're not rushing.
- When walking on steps, always use the hand rails and make sure to plant your feet firmly on each step.
- When walking on an icy or snow-covered walkway, take short steps and walk at a slower pace so you can react quickly to a change in traction.
- Streets and sidewalks that have been cleared

of snow and ice should still be approached with caution. Look out for black ice.



- Carrying heavy items can challenge your sense of balance. Try not to carry too much. You need to leave your hands and arms free to better balance yourself.
- When entering a building, remove as much snow and water from your shoes as possible.

#### **Recipe of the Month**

# **Hearty Vegetable Bean Soup**

#### **Ingredients:**

- 1 teaspoon olive oil
- 1/2 cup diced onions
- 1/2 cup diced red peppers
- 1/2 cup diced carrots
- 1/8 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1/2 teaspoon oregano
- 1/2 teaspoon parsley
- 1-1/2 cup broth (beef, chicken or vegetable)
- 1/2 cup tomato sauce
- One 19-ounce can pinto beans, drained & rinsed
- 1/2 teaspoon brown sugar
- 1/8 teaspoon black pepper
- 1 pound hamburger
- 1/2 cup rice (brown or white)

**Directions:** Heat oil in large soup pot over medium heat. Add onions, peppers, carrots, garlic powder, oregano, parsley and rice. Cook hamburger and add to pot. Cook until vegetables are soft. Add rest of ingredients. Bring to boil. Reduce to simmer and cook covered 15 to 20 minutes until all cooked.
