You've Got to Stand for Something

When I was in school, I never really enjoyed writing. Given my nature I worked that much harder to ensure a good grade but often the subject matter required by various teachers strained my limited patience. I mean what high–school aged boy wants to read and write about "Wuthering Heights" or Jane Eyre?

While preparing to write this month's article, I reviewed some of my previous submissions. I discovered that I thoroughly enjoyed writing these articles. For a moment I was confused but then the light bulb came on and I realized that I enjoy it because of the subject matter. From the Annual Report to topics on safety and our employees, this material is fun! Okay I will admit that it may only seem fun because I am an engineer by education and a utility manager by vocation. No

matter what the monthly topic is, you might notice that I always refer to CEC as YOUR cooperative. In the cooperative electric utility world that is a big deal. Rural electric cooperatives were formed to provide rural America with electricity. The Rural Electrification Act allowed the government to provide loans used to start the program but it was not the government that made these organizations work. It was you, our members. The principles below helped with the formation of cooperatives and continue to guide us today.

The Seven Cooperative Principles

All cooperative businesses adhere to these seven guiding principles.

1. Voluntary and Open

Membership Cooperatives are voluntary organizations, open to all persons able to use their services and willing to accept the responsibilities of membership, without gender, social, racial, political or religious discrimination.

2. Democratic Member Con-

trol Cooperatives are democratic organizations controlled by their

capital subscribed as a condition of membership. Members allocate surpluses for any or all of the following purposes: developing the cooperative, possibly by setting up reserves, part of which at least would be indivisible; benefiting members in proportion to their transactions with the cooperative; and supporting other activities approved by the membership. **4. Autonomy and Independence**



members, who actively participate in setting policies and making decisions. The elected representatives are accountable to the membership. In primary cooperatives, members have equal voting rights (one member, one vote) and cooperatives at other levels are organized in a democratic manner.

3. Members' Economic Participation Members contribute equitably to, and democratically control, the capital of their cooperative. At least part of that capital is usually the common property of the cooperative. Members receive limited compensation, if any, on Cooperatives are autonomous, self-help organizations controlled by their members. If they enter into agreements with others organizations, including governments, or raise capital from external sources, they do so on terms that ensure democratic control by their members and maintain their cooperative autonomy.

5. Education, Training, and Information Cooperatives provide education and training for their members, elected representatives, managers, and employees so they can contribute effectively to the development of their cooperatives. They inform the general public,

Recipe of the Month

Pork Chop Casserole

Ingredients:

- 1 cup uncooked rice
- 4–6 pork chops
- 1 can cream of mushroom soup
- 1 can cream of celery soup
- I package onion soup mix
- 1 soup can water

Directions:

- 1. Blend all soups and water together.
- 2. Place rice in the bottom of a 9X13 inch baking dish.
- 3. Mix rice with 3/4 cup soup mixture.

4. Lay pork chops in a single layer and pour rest of soup mixture over the chops.

5. Cover tightly and bake for 2 hours at 350 degrees Fahrenheit
