

Anniversary

Last month's article was titled "Engagement Announcement" so "Anniversary" seemed appropriate this month. April 6 marks my seventh anniversary with Central Electric Cooperative (CEC). (Thank you all for your support, by the way.) I had worked for an investor owned utility and a public power company, and, while there are similarities when it comes to the distribution of electricity, there are significant differences that drew me to the cooperatives. An excellent example of those differences is the Youth Tour program.

I recently participated in selecting students to represent CEC for this year's Youth Tour. Each year we meet, and interview, some amazing high school juniors. Our committee is always impressed with how poised and accomplished these young people are at such a young age. This year's group was no

exception, but I took particular note as I have a son who is a junior this year. As a non-member and son of an employee, my son is not eligible for the program but it is wonderful to interact with such a fine group of his contemporaries. These students represent five different high schools in our service territory.

The Electric Cooperative Youth Tour has brought high school students to Washington, D.C. for a week in June every year since the late 1950s. Local electric cooperatives accept applications and select students for this program. Youth Tour students see their nation's capital and gain a personal understanding of American history. They learn about the political process and their role as citizens by meeting their elected officials who spend time with them and answer questions. While student groups are organized at the state level, they all

come together for Youth Day when they get to meet each other and hear featured speakers who provide insight into the important roles electric cooperatives play in their communities.

Nearly 50,000 students from rural areas and small towns across America have participated in this program. Some of our Youth Tour alumni have gone on to design airplanes, lead companies and serve in the highest ranks of our government, including the U.S. Senate. While several of our alumni work in Washington, you will find even more alumni in your own community.

Senator Lyndon Baines Johnson inspired the Youth Tour when he addressed the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association (NRECA) Annual Meeting in Chicago in 1957. The Senator, and future president, declared, "If one thing comes out of this meeting, it will be sending youngsters to the national capital where they can actually see what the flag stands for, and represents."

Consequently, some Texas electric cooperatives sent groups of young people to Washington to work during the summer in Senator Johnson's office. In 1958, a rural electric cooperative in Iowa sponsored the first group of 34 young people on a weeklong study tour of our nation's capital. Later that same year, another busload came to Washington from Illinois. The idea grew and other states sent busloads of young people throughout the summer. By 1959, the "Youth Tour" had grown

to 130 students.

In 1964, the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association (NRECA) began to coordinate joint activities among the state delegations and suggested that co-op representatives from each state arrange to be in Washington, D.C. during Youth Tour week. The first year of the coordinated tour included approximately 400 young people from 12 states. Word of the program has continued to spread and today more than 1,500 students, and over 250 chaperones, participate in the Youth Tour every year.

So, in June of this year, Washington will be inundated with some of our best and brightest, including our representatives. The students always tell us what an amazing experience the Youth Tour is, and that it provides memories and connections that last a lifetime. After meeting these students though, I think it is fair to say that our federal representatives will have a great experience as well.

I would like to thank our board of directors for their continued support of this exceptional program, as well as all of the students who have participated, are participating, and will participate in the program for making it the growing success that it is.

Bicycling Safely

It's a beautiful spring day, what could be more perfect than a bike ride? But wait! Before you get your bike out of storage it's important to know how to stay safe on two wheels.

- Protect your head. Always wear a helmet.
- Stay visible. If drivers can see you, they are less likely to hit you. Use lights when biking at night or in low-light conditions.
- Look, signal and look again. Use hand signals to let other drivers know where you're going. Always look and make eye contact. Don't assume others will stop.
- Stay alert. Watch for obstacles in your path.

- Go with the flow. Bike in the direction of traffic.

- Don't get distracted.

Don't listen to music or talk on the phone while riding.

- Obey all traffic laws and lights.
- Be sure your bike is properly adjusted and the seat is in a comfortable position.
- Do a quick bike test. Check your brakes and your wheels. Make sure "quick release" wheels are properly secured.

Electric Usage with SmartHub

Did you know you can review your electric use with CEC's online account management program, SmartHub? Did you also know you can see how much your electric bill is going to be before you receive it in the mail? The process is quick and easy.

To get started, log on to our website www.central.coop and click on the SmartHub link in the top right corner. First-time users should click on New User, enter their CEC account number and their email address. Create a password and you're finished! Members who use mobile devices, such as smartphones and tablets, can download the SmartHub app for free!

Electric consumption information is found under the My Usage tab. Kilowatt-hour usage is displayed in bar graph form, along with daily temperatures. Data can be viewed in graph or tabular form and by year, month, week or daily consumption.

The My Usage feature also provides a way to track energy usage after you make changes at home (add an appliance, turn on an electric space heater, correct an electrical problem, etc.). The weather's

effect on energy consumption is also clearly illustrated to help answer your high bill questions.

It's also helpful for seasonal account members, who are not at their property, to know if they left something mistakenly "on."

SmartHub offers other features besides daily energy usage. Users can sign up to be notified when their bill is due, pay bills, review payment history, report an outage or ask for more information from a member service representative.

CEC's Annual Pole Inspection

As part of CEC's ongoing effort to improve system reliability, contracted pole inspection crews will begin inspecting 6,000 poles in the areas of Rockland and Coalhill substations.

Inspections typically include a visual inspection, sounding the pole with a hammer and excavation up to 18 inches around the poles. Poles identified as having issues will either be addressed in the field by Osmose Utilities Services or by CEC personnel at a later time. All Osmose representatives and CEC employees carry company-issued identification.

Recipe of the Month

Strawberry Angel Food Dessert

Ingredients:

- 1 large package of strawberry Jell-O®
- 16-ounce package frozen strawberries
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 1 angel food bar cake torn into small pieces (or you can use one half of a round cake)
- 8-ounce tub of Cool Whip®

Directions: Mix 2-1/2 cups boiling water with Jell-O® mix. Stir in sugar and partially thawed strawberries. Cool until partially thickened. Fold Cool Whip[®] into the mixture. Cover the bottom of a 13 x 9 pan with half of the cake pieces. Pour half of the Jell-O® mixture over. Repeat. Chill until set.
