

Two years ago when my family and I were considering the move from Oregon's coast to Western Pennsylvania, for the opportunity to work at Central Electric Cooperative (CEC), I was working for a public power company. It was also a not-forprofit organization governed by a locally elected board and was similar to a cooperative in many ways. But as I looked closer I found cooperatives, as private not-for-profit organizations, have many beneficial differences. We are part of the communities we serve and our employees are your neighbors, friends, community members, youth coaches and so much more. We also help our local volunteer fire departments as well as other community organizations whenever we can. As I researched this organization I was impressed with the dedication of the employees to both the members and the community.

The final piece, and frankly one of the most compelling, was their commitment to our youth. CEC has an annual scholarship program that has expanded dramatically over the years and through the use of escheats (unclaimed property) dollars, is funded at no additional cost to members. One program that is organized through the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association (NRECA) that also caught my attention is the Electric Cooperative Youth Tour. This is a remarkable program, unique to cooperatives, and specifically designed for our youth. CEC recently started to participate once again in this program.

Let me tell you a little about the Electric Cooperative Youth Tour. Senator Lyndon Baines Johnson inspired this program when he addressed the NRECA's Annual Meeting in Chicago in 1957. The senator and future president declared, "If one thing goes out of this meeting, it will be sending voungsters to the national capital where they can actually see what the flag stands for and represents." The Youth Tour has brought high school students to Washington every June since the late 1950s. Students compete for slots in this unique program and are selected by their local electric cooperative. Here at CEC we use this selection process as an opportunity to educate the candidates about their cooperative.

Featured speakers during the

Youth Tour provide insights to the important roles electric cooperatives play in their community. Students gain a personal understanding of American history and their role as a citizen by meeting their representatives and senators, and exploring the sights around our nation's capital. They often run into a former Youth Tour participant who is a congressional aide on Capitol Hill. Yes, several of our alumni work in Washington.

Over 40,000 students from rural areas and small towns across America have participated in this program. Some of our alumni have gone onto designing airplanes and serving in the highest ranks of our government, including the U.S. Senate. Through the use of escheats dollars we have been able to expand our participation in this program at no additional cost to CEC members. Elsewhere in this issue you will be introduced to this year's CEC Youth Tour representatives. I've had the opportunity to meet these exceptional young people and you can rest assured they will represent you very well. You will also have the opportunity to meet them at our 75th annual meeting on Saturday, Sept. 29th. Please excuse the shameless plug for our annual meeting. Thank you for your continued support and, as always, if you have any questions, comments or concerns don't hesitate to call and we look forward to seeing you in September.

Summer will be here before you know it. Now is the time to prepare for those hot and hazy days ahead. Here is a list of COOL actions that could save you some money this season:

- Ceiling fans: Make sure to dust off the blades before using.
- Air conditioning window unit: Remove and wash foam filter with soap and water. Inspect air—sealing materials around unit for cracks and voids.
- **Dehumidifiers:** Clean dust and debris off coils with soapy warm water.
- Heat pumps or central air conditioning outdoor units: Hire a professional to inspect the system.

Get Ready for Summer

Remove leaf debris and vegetation from around the unit.

- Furnace filter: Replace or clean your furnace filter on central air units or heat pump systems.
- **Lighting:** Replace incandescent bulbs with compact fluorescent lights (CFLs). They use 75 percent less energy!
- Window shades: Invest in mini blinds great energy savers that help keep out the heat from direct summer sunlight.

And don't forget to conserve this June when you hear our Peak Alert radio announcements. Be cool and save some money. You'll need it to afford that gasoline!

M Chain Saw Safety

A chain saw is a very efficient tool. But it can be dangerous if used incorrectly. Wearing the proper clothing is the first step to creating a safe environment. Protective equipment cannot prevent an accident from happening, but it can help reduce the level of injury if one does occur.

Protect head and hands:
Never saw without a
helmet, including a
full-coverage visor and
hearing protection.

- **Sturdy footwear:** Make sure your boots have a protective toecap, saw protection and a heavy tread.
- Protective eye wear: Use safety glasses to avoid dust and debris.
- Protective trousers and jacket:

 Trousers with saw protection are recommended. They stop the chain saw quickly to minimize the saw coming into contact with your leg.

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Recipe of the Month

Milk Chocolate Peanut Butter Chip Cookies

Ingredients:

- 1 cup shortening
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 3/4 cup brown sugar
- 2 eggs (make sure they are cold)
- 2 tablespoons ice cold water
- 3-1/2 cups flour
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 bag milk chocolate and peanut butter chips
- 1 cup chopped walnuts

Directions:

- 1. Mix shortening, sugar and brown sugar with mixer. Then add eggs, cold water and vanilla.
- 2. Next mix together flour, soda and baking powder. Add the dry ingredients to the wet mixture one cup at a time; mixing after each cup; add chips and nuts.
- 3. Drop large spoonfuls onto ungreased cookie sheet. Bake at 350 degrees Fahrenheit for 10 to 12 minutes. At 7 minutes reverse your cookie sheet.
