PowerLines

Choice

McDonalds or Burger King, Coke or Pepsi, paper or plastic, we make choices every day and thankfully, most are not of great importance. Since 1998, the topic of choice has been part of the conversation for electric service providers in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Beginning in January 2011, electric utility consumers throughout the state were offered a choice in regards to who they would purchase their generation services from. Many of you have probably received phone calls or something in the mail from potential energy suppliers asking if you would like to switch suppliers. You might have experienced those calls hanging up on you once you mentioned you’re a cooperative member, since they don’t offer that service to you.

I should probably give you a quick overview of electric systems and what is meant by “choice” before I explain the process that exists today. The electrical system that supplies power to your homes and businesses is basically broken into three main pieces; distribution, transmission and generation. The part that connects directly to you, and is most visible in the form of poles and wires, is called the distribution system. Distribution is the piece Central Electric Cooperative (CEC) owns and operates, and is the system we use to deliver your service. The next piece is transmission and this part of the system is the link between the generator and our distribution system. The transmission system takes large quantities of supply over long distances at high voltage to be

handed off to the distribution systems. Lastly is generation. As the name implies, these are the units creating power that is subsequently transmitted and distributed. You have probably heard a lot of discussion about nuclear, coal fired, natural gas, wind and solar generation. These are simply the fuel sources used by the generator in order to create electricity. So in an oversimplified nutshell we have one system broken into three pieces to generate, transmit and distribute electric power.

Due to the integrated nature of the system just described, and a desire not to duplicate sets of wires, poles, substations and transmission towers, the “choice” decision is restricted to that of generation supply. More specifically, people who choose a different generation supplier will still have the same distribution company. As a matter of fact, many of the investor owned utilities do the billing for the alternate generation supplier, so the customer still receives a bill from the same distribution company with a separate line item for generation costs. The costs of the transmission piece of the system are handled differently by different companies but those costs are built into either the distribution or generation piece for the purposes of billing.

At this point, if you were watching television or listening to the radio, most of you would be changing the channel. Let me give you what you

have been waiting for ... **How does this impact me?** The short answer is this has no effect on our members at this time. Even though some of you have received mail or telephone solicitations, no other supplier is offering service to our membership at this time. That isn't to say that they won't because cooperatives are not exempt from choice. In order for an electric generation supplier (EGS) to offer generation choice to our members, they must enter into an agreement with CEC and Allegheny Electric Cooperative. This is required because the EGS needs our data regarding your usage in order to appropriately bill you. CEC has taken preliminary steps to prepare for the possibility, of working with an EGS in the future. We have held off on making any significant expenditure to accommodate the possibility because we don't want to have any stranded investment if no EGS chooses to sell to our membership.

Some electric distribution entities are exempt from this process. As I mentioned, we are not exempt. I believe a part of the reason that EGSs' are not attracted to our system is the very reason that we exist. The rural nature of our system and low number of members per mile of line makes us less attractive to a profit-driven generation supplier.

Be Alert for Peak Alerts

Did you know that your cooperative pays more for power during hot summer days than at other times of the year? But if power costs for the cooperative go up, eventually your price per kilowatt-hour will, as well.

Our coordinated load management program helps reduce expensive power purchases. You can also voluntarily participate by conserving power usage during CEC's Peak Alerts.

A Peak Alert is a radio announcement during hot summer afternoons (between 12 and 6 p.m.) asking CEC members to turn up thermostats on air conditioner units, turn off pool pumps and dehumidifiers, and

reschedule household chores to early evening.

Listen for radio Peak Alert announcements at the top and bottom of each hour's newscasts. The following local stations carry the alerts:



Recipe of the Month

Black Bean and Roasted Corn Salad

Ingredients:

Salad:

- 6 ears of corn, or 2 boxes of frozen corn, or two cans of corn
- 2 (15–1/2 ounce) cans black beans, rinsed and drained
- 1 small red onion, chopped finely
- 2 avocados, chopped in 1 inch chunks
- 1 red bell pepper, chopped
- 1 bunch cilantro, chopped
- 2 jalapenos, seeded and chopped

Dressing:

- Juice from one lime (or lemon)
- 1 teaspoon sugar, agave or honey
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- Salt and pepper to taste

Directions:

If using fresh corn, cut corn from ears. If not, drain or thaw enough to spread corn on oiled cookie sheet and roast for about 7 minutes to enhance the sweetness. Combine all ingredients except the avocados and cilantro. Make the dressing by whisking the lime juice with the olive oil. Add the sugar and whisk more. Add the avocados and cilantro. Pour dressing over the salad and stir gently. **Note: you can substitute a can of corn or black beans with another type of bean.**
