
Ken Durrett Butler, PA

Backyard swimming pools are a great way to keep everyone cool on a hot summer day. Unfortunately, they use a lot of energy. Here are some ways to operate them and keep your electric bill manageable.

- Use a two—speed or variable speed pump to reduce operating costs by as much as 90 percent. A pool uses 60 to 80 percent of its energy for pumping and filtration.
- Run your pump eight to 12 hours per day. Three separate run times work best. Please try not to run between 2 and 6 p.m. if it is a "peak alert" day.

Pools and Power

- Cover your pool to help reduce heat loss and evaporation as well as debris build up.
- Use a heat pump pool heater to provide low—cost comfort over a conventional heater
- Remove tree branches and other vegetation that blocks sun light from your pool's surface to provide maximum "natural" pool heat.

Safety is always a concern when maintaining a pool. Make sure your pool pump's power supply is protected with a ground–fault circuit interrupter (GFCI) breaker or receptacle. Have fun, be safe and save money!

Tornadoes can strike at anytime during the year. There is a small chance that a tornado will strike your home.

Follow these tips and be prepared:

■ Stay tuned to your local weather.

If a tornado "watch" is issued it means a tornado is possible.

If a tornado "warning" is issued it means that a tornado has been spotted or strongly indicated by radar.

homes and vehicles! Seek shelter in a substantial structure or ditch.

- Protect your head and chest by crouching face first to the floor with your hands behind your head.
- Hide under steady furniture.
- Avoid candles, gas lanterns and oil lamps.
- Wear shoes to protect your feet from broken glass.
